

JANUARY

Anything left on the ground and exposed to rain can cause water pollution. Storm drains carry untreated rainwater from paved areas directly to local creeks and streams.

You may be surprised at how much your car care habits affect water quality. Fortunately, there are many things such as fixing and repairing leaks that you can do to prevent your automobile from being a source of water pollution.

1 DROP MATTERS!



BY PROPERLY MAINTAINING YOUR VEHICLES, You can prevent water pollution.

ONE DROP OF OIL LEAKED FROM EACH VEHICLE IN JEFFERSON COUNTY POLLUTES 16 MILLION GALLONS OF WATER PER DAY. PROMPTLY FIX AND REPAIR LEAKS.

You can clean up any spilled oil or vehicle fluids by sprinkling some absorbent material like cat litter on the area, let it soak up the drips, sweep it up, and dispose of it in the trash. Never use water to wash off paved surfaces.

Routinely monitor for leaks.
Follow recommended
maintenance. Carefully fuel
to avoid drips or spills.
Recycle used motor oil at
an oil change or retail facility
that accepts these materials.

Help for your home gardening challenges is just a phone call away. For any of your gardening inquiries, call a Master Gardener Volunteer at 1-877-252-GROW and select option 3 for the Birmingham area.

If your soil test report recommends adding lime or fertilizer to your soil, it will specify the amounts to use. Look for the 3 numbers for nitrogen, phosphorus, and/or potassium displayed on the fertilizer package to make sure you are purchasing the right product for your soil.

APRIL

You can set your spreader to the recommended application rate by adjusting its dial to the number specified in the package directions.

Using more fertilizer than recommended or using the wrong type will not help your lawn or garden to grow. Test your soil and read package directions to be sure!

When calculating the square footage of the area you plan to fertilize, don't forget to subtract the size of paved areas from the total. "SPREAD" THE WORD!

BY KEEPING FERTILIZER OFF OF PAVED AREAS, YOU CAN PREVENT WATER POLLUTION.

ANY EXCESS JUST GETS WASHED OFF BY RAINFALL OR IRRIGATION AND POLLUTES OUR WATERWAYS.
ALWAYS FOLLOW LABEL DIRECTIONS.

Never apply fertilizer right before or during a rain because it will be washed into the storm drainage system and carried to the nearest stream or creek.

Buy just enough product for the job so that you won't have to properly store any leftovers.

Finish the job by sweeping up any fertilizer that lands on paved areas!

MAY

Most wild animals do not live in close proximity to one another. That is why there is nothing natural about 150,000 domesticated dogs concentrated in an area the size of Jefferson County.

An average sized dog produces about 1/2 pound of waste per day. If you combine all of our dogs' waste, that's about 38 tons per day!

The average pile of dog waste contains 2.5 billion fecal coliform bacteria as well as viruses and parasites. These pathogens can live in both soil and water, and people and pets are at risk of illness if they are exposed to them.

IT'S YOUR "DOODY"

BY PICKING UP AND PROPERLY DISPOSING OF PET WASTE, YOU CAN PREVENT WATER POLLUTION.

PET WASTE CONTAINS HARMFUL BACTERIA WHICH IS WASHED BY RAINFALL AND IRRIGATION. PET WASTE POLLUTES OUR WATERWAYS.

Pets don't pick up after themselves. So until that happens, it's YOUR 'doody':

- 1- Pick it up.
- 2 Bag it.
- 3 Trash it.

Dog waste does NOT fertilize the grass. If not picked up and properly discarded it can wind up in local creeks and streams when rain washes it from the ground.

Got bugs? Call the Plant Diagnostic Lab in Birmingham at 205-879-6964 ext. 19 to help you identify the insect problems and diseases that are plaguing your lawn or garden.

Some bugs are beneficial to humans because they eat harmful bugs and assist in helping keep plants healthy. Some even perform vital functions for our food crops.

Integrated pest management (IPM) strategies are simple. Identify the pest before reacting. Start with non-chemical tactics. If pesticides are needed, use the least toxic products first.

"BEE" RESPONSIBLE!



PESTICIDES DON'T PICK & CHOOSE

INSECTICIDES KILL ALL INSECTS, EVEN THE ONES YOU DID NOT INTEND TO HARM, SUCH AS OUR FOOD POLLINATORS.

CONSIDER ALTERNATIVES TO PESTICIDES. CHOOSE THE LEAST TOXIC PRODUCTS FIRST. APPLY PRODUCTS ONLY IN THE LATE EVENINGS WHEN POLLINATORS ARE NOT ACTIVE.

Butterflies and other pollinators are dying because they are the unintended casualties of broad spectrum pesticide application. Spot treat affected plants and avoid over spray.

If bees completely disappear, more than 1/3 of the world's crops would disappear. There also would be much less feed for raising livestock.

You can do your part by using pesticides only when necessary, and spraying early in the morning or late in the evening when pollinators are not out looking for food. Consider planting bee friendly plants in your yard. Visit www.aces.edu/urban/TreesforBees to learn more!

JULY

Stormwater picks up pollution as it comes in contact with the ground, paved areas, and other surfaces, and carries these untreated substances into the storm drain system. Stormwater that carries pollution is called polluted runoff.

Reduce runoff by aerating your lawn and amending your soil to enhance its water retention.

Water early in the morning or late in the evening to reduce evaporation and maximize watering efficiency.

REDUCE RUNOFF!



WATER THE LAWN, NOT THE STREET

BY KEEPING WATER FROM LEAVING YOUR PROPERTY, YOU CAN PREVENT WATER RUNOFF AND WATER POLLUTION.

RUNOFF CARRIES LAWN PRODUCTS AND LOOSE SOIL TO OUR WATERWAYS CAUSING POLLUTION. DIRECT SPRINKLERS AND DOWNSPOUTS ONTO LAWNS, NOT DRIVEWAYS & SIDEWALKS.

Look for ways to reduce the amount of water your yard needs. Choosing native plants which are drought and pest resistant is a good start. Visit www.aces.edu for more information.

Add or reapply mulch to garden beds to retain moisture and reduce the frequency of watering.

Look for ways to keep rainwater on your property by using features such as rain barrels or rain gardens in your landscape to slow it down, spread it out, and allow it to soak in.

SEPTEMBER

Instead of piling your leaves or grass clippings on the curb, start looking at them as a resource instead of a nuisance by using them as mulch or in a compost pile.

You can reduce the amount of garbage your household generates by adding kitchen scraps such as vegetable and fruit peels, coffee grounds, and egg shells to your compost pile. Never add grease, animal waste, or other animal products to the pile.

Dawn:

Once Direcus decides on how to move forward based on the 3 options below we will then need your help in numbering the artwork accordingly. Then we also need you to reach out to Chris to judge.

Direcus:

Given that the calendar is your creation, Lyn and I feel it appropriate that you are the one that needs to decide how to proceed from here. We have listed three options below for your review concerning the artwork as well as made a recommendation to reduce our judging panel down to three. Please let us know which option you would like to proceed with by lunchtime Monday, June 8.

The original calendar plan with the BCAP kids was to:

Have the kids recreate a poster for each month with various materials.

Have 5 judges from various organizations choose the winning artwork for each month.

The winning artwork will replace the stormwater posters for each month as well as serve as the cover art.

Each student that created the winning artwork would be given a FREE week of gross out camp. Up to 13 winners will be selected because all students will submit artwork for the cover in addition to the other months.

Given unforeseen and uncontrollable circumstances, not all months have artwork to choose from. AND of the months that contain artwork to choose from, the artwork doesn't necessarily display the months poster topic.

I recommend that BEFORE we contact the judges, we need to be very clear on the judging instructions. In order to do that we need to decide on how we plan to use the artwork created. For example do we:

- a. Keep the original plan and choose the best artwork for that respective month/topic. If that
 month/topic doesn't have artwork, then there is nothing to judge and the calendar will contain
 our original stormwater poster. (This would mean there are not 13 artwork winners).
- b. Have the judges pick 13 pictures 12 that relate to stormwater topics (litter/debris, yard chemicals, runoff reduction, oil and grease, etc) and 1 for the cover. Then we can match the artwork with the months as we see fit. BUT to keep with our monthly topic, we can have a smaller version of our poster on the side bar in the same area where the callouts are in our

current calendar. We can add a box under the artwork that would include information about the student (school, age, name). Then to tie back to the month's pollutant theme <u>Birmingham Storm Water staff</u> could follow up with the student winners and ask them how they think they can prevent that pollutant. Then ask the students something fun – like favorite flavor of ice cream. (This scenario would potentially mean the same student could have created more than 1 winning artwork*)

c. Keep stormwater posters as the main picture and use the artwork as a side callout. Judges would pick the top 13 favorites; 1 is used as the cover and the other 12 will be used as a 'monthly highlight' featured in the callout area. (This would potentially mean the same student could have created more than 1 winning artwork*)
